

Graduating from the Naval Academy in 1927.
Captain Cecil T. Caufield since has had a varied naval career which included service aboard the USS New York, assignment to the Nicaraguan Electoral Mission, service on the USS Preston, USS McLeish, USS Bushnell, USS Hale and USS Wicks. Captain Caufield also served a tour of duty at the Naval Academy as an instructor.

1938 to 1944 Captain Caufield served about the USS Monocacy, USS Fox, (the Captain's first ship as Commanding Officer) USS Kendrick and USS Prichett. While on duty in China Captain Caufield went through the Japanese-Chinese lines to evacuate missionaries from a summer resort at Kuling.

In 1944 Captain Caufield was in command of the West Coast Sound School and Sound Training Squadron, then served in the Undersea Warfare Division of the Chief of Naval Operations in 1947, shortly after commanding the USS Yancey.

Among the decorations the Captain has received are the Silver Star, Bronze Star with a gold star in lieu of second award and the SecNav Commendation Ribbon.

Captain Caufield is the sixteenth Commander of the Training Center.

Captain Burris D. Wood, Jr., graduated from the Naval Academy in 1935, and served on the USS Mississippi, USS Tuscaloosa, USS Roe, USS Ellis and on the Staff of ComFastCarrier Task Force on the USS Lexington and USS Yorktown. During this latter assignment in World War II he received the Bronze Star with combat award and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Captain Wood received the Commendation Ribbon with Combat Award while serving as Commanding Officer of the USS Harry E. Hubbard (DD-748) during the Korean conflict, following which he was assigned duty as Executive Officer, Naval Administrative Command at the U. S. Naval Training Center. On 1 September 1955 Captain Wood assumed command of the Naval Administrative Command upon the detachment of Captain G. W. Willcox.




