REAR ADMIRAL LOUISE C. WILMOT, USN **COMMANDER NAVAL TRAINING CENTER**

Rear Admiral Louise C. Wilmot graduated from the College of Saint Elizabeth, Convent Station, New Jersey, in June 1964 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in History. She received her commission as an ensign in the United States Navy from Officer Candidate School in Newport, Rhode Island, in August 1964. Her first duty station was Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Florida, where she was a Communication Watch Officer, Registered Publication's Custodian, and the Women's Barracks Officer. She reported to the NATO Staff of Allied Forces, Southern Europe, Naples, Italy, in 1966 where she served in communications and training for two years.

Her next assignment was as an officer recruiter on the staff of Recruiting Area Seven in Dallas, Texas. Rear Admiral Wilmot recruited in New Mexico, Oklahoma, and northern Texas. Following her recruiting assignment, she went to Washington, D.C., as a Naval Senate Liaison Officer in the Office of Legislative Affairs. After three years at the U.S. Senate, Rear Admiral Wilmot was transferred to the Bureau of Naval Personnel to become the Head of the

Women's Equal Opportunity Branch where she served from 1975-1976. Rear Admiral Wilmot graduated from the Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, in July 1977. She received her Master of Arts degree in Legislative


Affairs from George Washington University in 1978. She served as the Executive Officer, Navy Recruiting District, Montgomery, Alabama, from August 1977 until 1979. After her promotion to Commander, she assumed command of the Navy Recruiting District, Omaha, Nebraska, where she served from October 1979 until July 1982. Rear Admiral Wilmot's next tour of duty was in the office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Manpower, Installations, and Logistics, in Washington, D.C., as the Deputy Director for Accession Policy.

In August 1985, Rear Admiral Wilmot became Commander, Navy Recruiting Area Five, Great Lakes Illinois, where she served for two years. After that assignment, Rear Admiral Wilmot assumed the duties as Executive Assistant and Naval Aide to the Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Manpower and

Reserve Affairs, Washington, D.C.

Rear Admiral Wilmot's decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit (with gold star) Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Meritorious Unit Commendation (with bronze star) Medal, and the National Defense Medal. She assumed the position of Commander, Naval Training Center, Orlando on 1 May 1989 and was promoted to her present rank of Rear Admiral on 20 April 1990. CAPTAIN THOMAS TIMINGS HOLME, JR. **UNITED STATES NAVY COMMANDING OFFICER** RECRUIT TRAINING COMMAND

Captain Holme was born in Abington Township, Pennsylvania on 8 September 1941 and grew up in Connecticut, attending public school there. He was commissioned an Ensign through the regular NROTC program and holds a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science from Yale University (1963) and a Master of Arts degree in Political Science from the University of Maryland (1971). His military education includes Submarine School and Defense Intelligence School (Post Graduate Intelligence and Attache courses).

Captain Holme, a qualified submariner and "proven subspecialist" in both intelligence and political/military strategic planning, has held a variety of assignments at sea and ashore. He served as Commanding Officer of USS Waterford (ARD 5) from 1977 to 1979 and then served as variety of assignments at sea and ashore. Following that assignment Captain Holme served as Naval Attache and Naval Attache for Air, Moscow, Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. From November 1986 until April 1989, Captain Holme served the Director of Central Intelligence, as Assistant National Intelligence Officer for General Purpose Forces, on the staff of the National Intelligence Council.

Following his assignment to the Central Intelligence Agency, Captain Holme began his present assignment as Commanding Officer, Recruit Training Command, Orlando.

Captain Holme has been awarded the Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, and Navy Commendation Medal with two Gold Stars. He is also entitled to wear Submarine, Command-at-Sea and

REAR ADMIRAL LEONARD N. ODEN UNITED STATES NAVY COMMANDER NAVAL TRAINING CENTER

Rear Admiral Leonard N. Oden, a native of Seekonk, Massachusetts, graduated from Tufts University in 1963. He was commissioned an Ensign and designated a naval flight officer in 1964.

Early sea duty assignments included operational flying with VAW-12, VAW-120, VAW-122 ("plank owner"), VAW-123, and the staff of Commander Cruiser Destroyer Flotilla EIGHT. Early shore assignments included duties as Administrative Assistant to Commander Carrier Airborne Early Warning Wing TWELVE and as a Sea Control Analyst in the Systems Analysis Division (OP-96) on the OPNAV staff.

Following an assignment as Special Assistant to the President, Naval War College, he completed the Naval War College Command and Staff course with highest distinction in 1975, receiving the Middendorf Award for Excellence in Advanced Research.

In December 1979 Rear Admiral Oden assumed command of the VAW-124 "Bear Aces" deploying on USS AMERICA (CV-66) and USS NIMITZ (CVN-68). Following his first ship's company tour aboard USS JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV-67) as Air Operations Officer, he returned to Newport in 1983 and completed the Naval War College Post Command course. Serving as Operations Officer aboard the USS INDEPENDENCE (CV-62), he participated in both the Grenada and Lebanon crisis. In 1984 he assumed command of VAW-120, the east coast E-2C fleet replacement squadron.

In May 1985, Rear Admiral Oden returned to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations as Deputy Director, Program Resource Appraisal Division (OP-91B). He completed the Senior Officials in National Security Program at Harvard University's JFK School of Government in 1986. Selected for major command at sea, he served as the twelfth Commanding Officer of USS INCHON (LPH-12). In November 1988, Rear Admiral Oden reported to the United States Atlantic Command as Deputy Director, Program Planning and Assessment (J8). Since January 1990, he has served as the twenty-third Commanding Officer of USS CONSTELLATION (CV-64). Selected for Rear Admiral in January 1991, he assumed command of Naval Training Center Orlando on June 4, 1991.

Rear Admiral Oden's personal awards include the Legion Of Merit (2), the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (3), the Navy Commendation Medal (2), and the Navy Achievement Medal (2).

Rear Admiral Oden and his wife Sue, have two children, Jon, a 1991 graduate of the College of William and Mary, and Heather, a senior at Virginia Commonwealth University.



CAPTAIN KATHLEEN MAE BRUYERE, USN COMMANDING OFFICER RECRUIT TRAINING COMMAND

Captain Kathleen Mae Bruyere, born in Newport News, Virginia, is a 25 year veteran of the US Navy. She is one of the 36 female Unrestricted Line Officers on active duty in the grade of Captain. Captain Bruyere, an advocate for women - civilian and military, was one of six women who filed and won a court action in 1978 that resulted in Title 10 USC 6015 being declared unconstitutional. This section of the US Code had prohibited Navy women from serving aboard ships at sea.

She began her naval career in June 1966 upon graduation from Chestnut Hill College, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania where she received a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science. Her first tour of duty was as a Communications Watch Officer at the Naval Communications Station, San Francisco, California followed by a tour as Administrative Officer at the Navy Space Systems Activity in Los Angeles, California. She was the first female officer ever to serve at this command.

Later, Captain Bruyere served as an Officer Recruiter at Navy Recruiting District, Los Angeles, California and with the Bureau of Naval Personnel (BUPERS) in Washington, DC in the Officer Distribution Division. After serving at BUPERS, Captain Bruyere became an Aide/Flag Secretary to the Commander, Training Command, US Pacific Fleet, San Diego, California. This assignment was another first for women.

After graduation from the College of Naval Command and Staff, Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, Captain Bruyere completed a tour as Executive Officer, Navy Recruiting District, New York. Soon anterward, she was assigned to the Office of the Office of the Officer of Navar Operations in Washington, DC where she served as the first Community Manager for approximately 3,000 active duty line officers in the Navy.

From September 1983 until July 1985, Captain Bruyere was Commanding Officer of the Personnel Support Activity, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. As Commanding Officer, she managed a staff of twenty-six along with six detachments of 300 military and civilian employees located throughout Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey. From August 1985 until September 1986, Captain Bruyere served as Executive Officer, Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps Unit, University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia. In October 1986, Captain Bruyere reported as Commanding Officer of Personnel Support Activity, Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. This command included four detachments in Hawaii and one in Australia with 400 military and civilian employees.

On March 1, 1988, Captain Bruyere once again reported to the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations where she served as Special Assistant for Women's Policy to the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations (Manpower, Personnel and Training) until her assignment as Commanding Officer, Recruit Training Command, Orlando, Florida.

Her decorations and awards include: the Legion of Merit; the Meritorious Service Medal; the Navy Commendation Medal with two gold stars; the Meritorious Unit Commendation; the National Defense Medal; the Recruiting Sevice Ribbon; Who's Who of American Women; and selection by TIME magazine, January 1976, as one of

the twelve "Women of the Year".

Captain Bruyere holds membership in the US Naval Institute (first woman elected in 110 years as a Director, Board of Control, 1983-86), the National Organization for Women, the National Women's Political Caucus, the National Association of Female Executives, the Women Officers' Professional Association (a founder and charter member), Women in Defense, National Naval Officers Association, the Naval Reserve Association and the Board of Directors, Girl Scout Council of the Nation's Capital, Washington, DC (1989-91).

Captain Bruyere is the daughter of Lieutenant Colonel Joseph P. Donahue, United States Army Reserve (RET) and Lucille Alessandroni Donahue, both formerly of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She is married to Captain Thomas E. Bruyere, USN (RET).
